2023-2024 District Budget Proposal

Proposed Budget: \$161,779,198 Budget-to-Budget Change: 6.7% Tax Rate Change: 1.98% or less

The Board of Education is pleased to present a proposed budget it believes is educationally sound, fiscally responsible, and equitable. Developing a budget is a complex task during a typical year, let alone addressing ongoing needs caused by a global pandemic and during a time of high inflation. Fortunately, this year's planning was made easier thanks to additional funding received from the state and federal governments. Although the Rush-Henrietta Central School District continues to deal with rising mandatory expenses, such as health insurance and special education, Board of Education members believe this budget is responsive to recent events, including the continuing effects of the pandemic on our students and community.

Rush-Henrietta is proposing a budget-to-budget increase of 6.7 percent. This is higher than normal and results from federal stimulus funds provided for incremental support. Under this proposal, the true value tax rate would increase 1.98 percent or less, and the total tax levy would be within the limits established under the state's Tax Levy Cap. Rush-Henrietta's tax rate will remain among the lowest of the 17 local suburban school districts. The Board of Education is pleased that the proposal maintains all educational programs for children.

Highlights of Proposed Budget

- Preserves instructional programs and services for more than 5,400 students.
- Maintains benefits of district's successful small-class-size initiative at K-3 schools.
- Provides incremental supports for student learning recovery.

What Does This Mean in Dollars and Cents?

- Taking into account the School Tax Relief (STAR) benefit for which all homeowners are eligible – a district resident owning a house assessed at \$200,000 would see school taxes increase by \$70 annually.
- One of Rush-Henrietta's objectives is to maintain existing programs and services while minimizing the impact to the taxpayer.

Did You Know?

- If the proposed budget is approved, Rush-Henrietta's true value tax rate in 2023-2024 will be lower than it was during the 2005-2006 school year.
- Moody's Investors Service recently reaffirmed the district's Aa2 Bond Rating, citing the district's "sound financial position, stable tax base influenced by a degree of institutional presence, and a below average direct debt burden." The district's reserve funds were cited as a financial strength.
- Rush-Henrietta has had one of the lowest true value tax rates in Monroe County for years.
 Under the proposed budget, Rush-Henrietta will have one of the lowest rates again next year.



From the Board of Education

May 1, 2023

Dear Community Resident:

On Tuesday, May 16, eligible voters in the Rush-Henrietta Central School District will have the opportunity to vote on the proposed 2023-2024 budget adopted by the Board of Education. We believe this proposal is educationally sound, fiscally responsible, equitable, and responsive to our changing economy and recent inflationary concerns.

Inflation is a challenge at home, and that is true here in the school district, as well. The change in the Consumer Price Index for the past year has been a stunning 8 percent. Our district has tried to identify additional efficiencies to help keep costs down for our community. One of our primary objectives is to maintain existing programs and services for students while minimizing any additional impact to the taxpayer. This proposed budget also maintains the benefits of the district's small-class-size initiative for K-3 students.

With this in mind, the Board of Education has adopted a budget that calls for a tax rate increase of 1.98 percent or less. For a decade, the final true value tax rate was lower than the proposed rate. The actual tax rate is established after town assessments are finalized. As in prior years, Rush-Henrietta's projected tax rate increase is among the lowest in Monroe County. If the proposed budget is approved by voters, our district's tax rate will be lower than it was nearly 20 years ago!

As a community, we are fortunate that Rush-Henrietta finds itself in a better position than many other districts. That is largely because of prudent financial decisions made during the past few decades. This allows us to preserve existing instructional programs and student services for next year while expanding support for students in areas school and district leaders identified.

All eligible voters are urged to vote between 6 a.m. and 9 p.m. Tuesday, May 16, 2023, at the Transportation and Operations Center, 1133 Lehigh Station Road. One does not need to own property in the district to vote, but must reside here and be a U.S. citizen. If you have questions, please contact a board trustee listed below.

Voters will have the opportunity to choose two candidates to serve on the Board of Education. In addition to the budget proposal, three more propositions are presented for voter approval. These propositions may be viewed on page 9.

With support from our students, parents, employees, and residents, the Rush-Henrietta Central School District continues to thrive. We appreciate the strong support our community continues to show for our school district and its students.

As elected representatives of district residents, and as officers of the state of New York, board members must carry out duties required by the state Legislature, the Board of Regents, and the state Commissioner of Education. The board establishes policies for the operation of the district. This year, eligible voters in Rush-Henrietta will elect two candidates to the Board of Education. 
If you are a United States citizen, will be at least 18 years old by May 16, 2023, and have been a resident of the school district at least 30 days prior to the vote, you may vote.



2023-2024 Proposed Expenditures

There are five expenditure categories in the 2023-2024 budget proposal, as outlined below, that support educational programs and school district operations.


Instruction: 52.6% — The instructional program is the largest category in the budget and is the focal point of our educational system. All services that provide, or directly affect, instruction to students are budgeted in this area. The following are included in this category: regular school program, special education, summer school and support services [school libraries, health, psychological and social work services, curriculum coordination and supervision, curriculum development, research and evaluation], BOCES instructional programs, student activities [interscholastic sports, intramurals, co-curricular activities] and required tuition payments for Rush-Henrietta students attending approved private and public school programs.

General Support: 9.7% — This part of the budget covers the areas that support the educational program through central administration, business operations, human resources, community relations, maintenance and repair of all district grounds and facilities, printing, mailing, district meetings, Board of Education and legal services.

Transportation: 6.4% — Includes bus transportation for more than 6,000 students to district, charter, parochial and private schools; BOCES centers for vocational and special education programs; field trips and athletic team trips.

Employee Benefits: 24.7% — Included in the employee benefits category are health insurance, retirement, social security, and the risk fund which includes unemployment insurance, worker's compensation insurance, disability and life insurance.

Other: 6.6% — A small portion of the budget is for other expenditures that include capital funding (buildings and grounds reconstruction, repairs, and improvements to all district buildings and grounds), and community services.

The Administrative Component provides for overall general support and management activities, including business office operations, payroll, purchasing, general administration, personnel, legal and auditing services. Cost for administration and supervision of each of the District's schools is also included in this component.






Celebrating Student Achievement

Advanced Placement Results

Advanced Placement courses are offered in many academic areas. In Rush-Henrietta, 379 students took 685 AP exams last spring; 438 scored at a "3" or higher. That means 67 percent of students earned a 3 or better on their exam. Exams are graded on scores of 1 to 5; scores of 3 and above generally are accepted for college credit. We continue to encourage our students to take advantage of these Advanced Placement offerings.



Rush-Henrietta continues to challenge its students to take more rigorous courses in an effort to increase their college readiness. For example, Rush-Henrietta requires all eighth graders to take Earth Science, a class typically taught elsewhere in ninth grade. This gives students the opportunity to take an extra year of science to prepare for college. Rush-Henrietta also offers more challenging math courses.



STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT DATA

The New York State Department of Education requires the district to make documents related to student achievement available prior to annual district budget votes. On May 16, 2023, Eligible Voters Will Vote On...

Proposition 1 BUDGET PROPOSITION Shall the following proposition be adopted?

Resolved, that the Board of Education of the Rush-Henrietta Central School District be authorized to expend the sum set forth in the estimate of amount of money required for school purposes during the fiscal year 2023-2024 in the total amount of \$161,779,198 and to levy the necessary tax therefore.

Proposition 2 BUS EXPENDITURES Shall the following proposition be adopted?

Resolved, that the Board of Education of the Rush-Henrietta Central School District be authorized to expend the sum of up to \$3,600,000 to be funded from the 2016 Bus Purchase Reserve, the balance in existing Capital Fund bus purchase funds, and the General Fund Transfer for the purchase and replacement of vehicles for the transportation of district students.

Proposition 3 2023 CAPITAL EXPENDITURES Shall the following proposition be adopted?

Resolved, that the Board of Education of the Rush-Henrietta Central School District be authorized to expend the sum of up to \$26,600,000 to be funded from undesignated balances in the Capital Fund and from the 2020 and 2022 Capital Reserve Funds for the rehabilitation and reconstruction of the school facilities and districtwide systems including, without limitation, the Burger, Crane, Fyle, Leary, Roth, Sherman, Sperry, Vollmer, Webster, and Winslow schools; the Parker Administration Building; the John R. "Jack" Gaffney West Henrietta Education Building; the TOC; the Good Shepherd buildings including razing of the old parish office and garage; such projects to include, without limitation, roof replacements; boiler replacements; sidewalk, parking lot, and bus loop replacement; classroom renovations including carpet, flooring, ceiling and lighting replacement; HVAC upgrades; ADA compliance; health, safety, and security projects including a High School secure vestibule and districtwide exterior door electronic access upgrades; High School pool and locker room renovations; door and window replacement; freezer/cooler replacement and renovation; clock system upgrades; fire alarm system upgrades; computer and media-related cabling; building exterior and interior upgrades and repairs; telephone and public address systems; lavatory renovations and installation; purchase of equipment; water heater replacements; emergency generators; food service equipment replacement; auditorium refurbishment; Good Shepherd to Webster move costs including Webster building renovations and new playground; office renovations; site improvements; electronic building security systems and security cameras.

Proposition 4 PURCHASE OF REAL PROPERTY 1871 LEHIGH STATION ROAD Shall the following proposition be adopted?

Resolved, that the Board of Education of the Rush-Henrietta Central School District be authorized to expend the sum of up to \$275,000, to be funded by a General Fund Transfer to Capital account, for the purchase of property, located at 1871 Lehigh Station Road, consisting of approximately 4.7 acres adjacent to the Senior High School, to be potentially developed to enhance the Senior High School facility and parking; with future intent to raze the existing house and barn on the property.

Propositions 2, 3 and 4 will NOT affect the tax rate.

Proposition 3: 2023 Capital Expenditures

A \$26.6 million capital project is being proposed to address a number of building repairs and renovations needed to maintain our aging infrastructure as well as provide some important security enhancements. All of the funding is coming from existing savings set aside to

maintain our buildings, so there is no borrowing and no increase in the tax levy. These renovations bring much needed updates and will enable our students to enjoy these facilities for many more years.

Significant repairs are needed to extend the life of the high school pool. The pool basin is original from when the school was built in 1966, and repairs are needed to fix leaks and cracks. These

repairs include replacing pool tiles which provides an opportunity for other improvements, including updating the spectator area and locker rooms, and new pool lighting. added to all exterior school doors in the district, allowing staff to use their badges to enter and alerts to be sent to the main office if any door is propped open.

Most of our schools were built in the 1960s or earlier, and repairs or upgrades to lighting and HVAC systems are needed. In addition, refreshing classroom spaces allows us to continue providing a vibrant, healthy learning space for our students. Safety remains a top district priority, and several security enhancements

are included in the proposal. A more welcoming and secure main entrance is proposed for the high school. Not only will a double set of locked doors provide greater security, but the foyer will be larger to accommodate students who are often waiting outside for transfer buses to private/ parochial schools or BOCES vocational programs, or gathering for sports or other activities. Proposition 4: Purchase of Real Property

The property at 1871 Lehigh Station Road includes 4.7 acres adjacent to the east parking lot of the Senior High School. This is a unique opportunity to add space at our landlocked high school. Although there are no immediate plans for this parcel, it may allow future projects to increase parking, alter traffic flow, or add a small sports field. The \$275,000 proposition is just for the purchase of the property; its use will be determined at a later time. As with the capital project, the money for this land purchase would come from existing savings and would not affect the tax rate.

Q. How are school taxes determined?

RUSH-HENRIETTA CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

Your school taxes are determined by three factors– the school tax levy, property assessments, and equalization rates.

- The school tax levy is the total dollar amount the district will collect from property owners to support the annual operating budget. Once approved, this amount is fixed and does not increase if assessments increase.
- In terms of property assessments, Rush-Henrietta uses property values provided by the four towns in the school district – Brighton, Henrietta, Pittsford, and Rush – to levy taxes. Each property within a town is assigned a value by the town assessor.
- Each year, the New York State Office of Real Property Services evaluates each town's assessment practices and sets specific equalization rates to ensure a fair tax burden distribution across the district. For this reason, an 8 percent increase in property assessments in one town does not mean that all four towns within our school district would experience the same increase. If the school tax levy increase is greater than the increase in property assessments for the district as a whole, the district's true value tax rate increases.

Q. How will the proposed budget affect homeowners?

The Board of Education's \$161.8 million budget proposal calls for a tax-rate increase of 1.98 percent or less. Taking into account the STAR benefit - for which all homeowners are eligible - a district resident owning a house assessed at \$200,000 would see school taxes rise by \$70 annually.
