## 2024–2025 District Budget Proposal

turnout, misinformation help drive Rush-Henrietta budget defeat."

Dear Rush-Henrietta Residents:

In May, the Board of Education's proposed 2024-2025 budget fell short of approval by 15 votes. As district leaders reflected on the outcome, we sought answers to explain what happened. We discovered there wasn't a single reason, but rather multiple ones. The Democrat and Chronicle reported about this in a May 23, 2024, story headlined: "Low

Turnout for the May vote was at a five-year low in Rush-Henrietta. This mirrors a trend seen by many local school districts. The newspaper article mentions the role that an uncontested Board of Education election can have on a budget vote. This appears to have been a contributing factor in our district. When there is no competition for board seats, turnout often diminishes. This year, three board incumbents ran unopposed, giving people less incentive to come and vote.

The newspaper also cited "misinformation" as an important reason. Rumors circulated before the vote that our superintendent requested a large raise. That is not true. The misunderstanding stemmed in part from how a line item was presented in the budget newsletter. We attempted to clarify this during public hearings, parent meetings, the Community Budget Forum, and through social media; we recognize these efforts were not enough. To be specific, the superintendent will receive a raise of 2.75 percent next year based on her contract.

In addition, there were three main takeaways from the exit polling data. 1) Residents want more information regarding the role of the deputy superintendent; we provide that in this newsletter. 2) Residents want the district to trim expenses; we propose a reduction of \$1.3 million from the original budget proposal. 3) The reassessment conducted last year by local towns caused some homeowners to see an increase in taxes. The district plays no role in that process and does not collect more tax money as a result. However, we acknowledge this impacted residents. The reductions we are proposing in this revised budget are an attempt to support those impacted by the reassessment.

It is clear that our residents value our school district and understand the important role it plays in supporting the day-today growth and development of children. The community's involvement in our schools has played an important role in our district's success for more than 75 years. Thank you for that!

My board colleagues and I respectfully ask all eligible voters to continue to participate in the process by voting on Rush-Henrietta's adjusted proposed budget Tuesday, June 18. 

## What is a Contingency Budget?

If voters reject an original budget proposal, school districts have the option to put the original budget up for a second vote, or to offer a revised budget as part of a second community vote.

In the event the second vote is not approved, or the district decides not to hold a second vote, the district must operate under what is known as a contingency budget. This is shown on page 2. The Board of Education decided to present a revised budget for voter approval Tuesday, June 18. If the revised budget is not approved, the district will be forced by state law to adopt a contingency budget. This would require an almost \$4 million overall reduction from the original budget.

## What Was Removed from the Original Budget?

In preparing for a second vote to be held Tuesday, June 18, the Board of Education agreed it would be wise to trim the budget in ways that will not negatively impact student learning, while at the same time acknowledging community concerns. In doing so, the budget proposal has been reduced by \$1.3 million. This results in an average 1.25 percent tax rate increase.

The following items from the original proposal have been removed in the revised proposal:

- A new director of recruiting.\* (\$105,000)
- Clerical support for the director of Career and Technical Education.\* (\$68,000)
- A teaching assistant position to assist with Chromebook repairs.\* (\$54,000)
- Monies to support the district's tax certiorari reserve fund. (\$25,000)
- Moving four special ed teaching positions to a federal grant (\$360,000)
- Food Services transfer since funding for free meals for students has been included in the state budget. (\$200,000)
- State aid reimbursement that would typically be directed to a reserve fund will instead be used for the general fund. (\$525,000)

\* The three positions outlined above were slated to be new additions for next school year and include salary and benefits.

## The Role of the Deputy Superintendent

During Dr. Mullen's hiring process last year, she emphasized her focus on student learning outcomes. She identified an opportunity to create the deputy superintendent position to help foster student success by supporting the delivery of high-quality instruction in our buildings and classrooms.

The deputy superintendent's responsibilities filled a gap the district identified to help support the adults who support our students. One of the most important duties is to provide additional support to principals and assistant principals. That is necessary because each leader at R-H, no matter how experienced, needs to be a learner. Professional growth has been a key point of emphasis since Dr. Mullen's arrival.

A significant amount of the deputy's time is spent engaging in providing direct support to each principal and assistant principal to boost student achievement. The district strives to identify evidencebased practices and help principals incorporate them. Outside of our teachers, principals can have the most profound impact on student learning. We take to heart the words of the organization New Leaders, which states: "Schoolwide systems for observation, coaching, and actionable feedback are often synonymous with instructional leadership and student gains."

R-H is committed to improving its instructional practices to better support students. The deputy superintendent is leading Professional Learning Communities, which occur monthly for principals and assistant principals. This effort is a recognized strategy to further develop school leaders and increase student achievement. After a meeting this year, administrators were asked to anonymously submit feedback. One said: "The fact that you took the time to listen to understand about (School Improvement Teams) and shift your thinking around it on the fly was impressive."

R-H's goal is for teachers to play a key role as members of the Instructional Leadership Team at each school next year. This will help support successful implementation and monitoring of each school's improvement plan. This effort is being led by the deputy superintendent.

The role also ensures that we have clear and effective policy implementation, which helps our district operate more efficiently and effectively for our students and community. This task is directly aligned to the board's goal of bringing district policies up to date. Since the deputy joined the district in July 2023, 59 policies have been updated. This work also helps the district in legal compliance with the State Education Department.

By supporting school improvement plans, the deputy superintendent also has played a role in helping to reduce chronic student absenteeism this year from 21 percent to 18 percent. That's impressive progress made during one school year. This number, by the way, was 10 percent before the pandemic and had risen as high as 23 percent last year. The deputy superintendent also has oversight of the district's Office of Professional Learning and Information Services.

#### What Will We Be Voting On June 18?

Only one item will be on the ballot. That is the budget proposition in the amount of \$170,237,893.

#### When And Where To Vote

All eligible voters are encouraged to participate. The vote will be held from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. Tuesday, June 18, 2024, at the Rush-Henrietta Transportation and Operations Center, 1133 Lehigh Station Road.

#### **Voter Qualifications:**

- You must be at least 18 years of age.
- You must be a citizen of the United States.
- You do not have to own property in the district.
- You must be a resident of the school district for at least 30 days immediately preceding the vote.

#### **Absentee Ballots**

Absentee ballots are available to qualified school district voters. An application for an absentee ballot must be completed. Given the short timeframe in which this revote is being held, absentee ballots at this time are available only to those who can return them to the Parker Administration Building by mail or in person no later than 5 p.m. Tuesday, June 18. A sidewalk dropbox is available at the administration building, which is located at 2034 Lehigh Station Road. For more information, contact District Clerk Cheryl Castronovo at 359-5010.
